"Störgeräusche" is an interactive performance by hannsjana about the feminist potential of acoustic interference, media and sturgeons. The title implies a play on words, as Störgeräusche in German could mean both "interference noise", as well as refer to the sounds of sturgeons (a species of fish). The performance was originally created as an audiowalk in Berlin's Museum for Communication, but due to the pandemic it was adapted to be performed in a digital meeting via Zoom. In the Zoom meeting, the audience could learn more about hannsjana's artistic practice, if it was not for constant interruptions and interference...

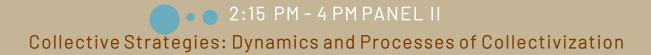
